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## March is Reading Month



## This Week's Focus

Phonics- This week students reviewed syllabication and common syllable patterns. Ask your child the trick we used to help us find the number of syllables in each word.

Reading- We continued in our three reading groups this week and students completed an activity about point of view. In this activity students had to write their opinion on various given scenarios. Then, at the end of the activity, students had to find a partner and compare their opinions to their partner's opinions.
We discussed that the life experiences we all have can shape and change our point of view on a given topic or situation. Much like the point of view of the characters in the books we are reading.

Writing- We continued in our informational writing unit this week with students continuing to find notes tailored to their selected subtopics and beginning to draft these notes into paragraph form.

Spelling- This week students studied homophones. This unit can be especially tricky given that many of the words sound the same. When practicing these words with your children it could be helpful to use the word in a sentence to make sure each child knows the meaning of the word as well as how to spell the various forms. A challenge and regular list were used this week.

Math-This week students started Chapter Nine. Students were introduced to the distributive property of multiplication and the associative property of multiplication. Students learned that the distributive property is similar to the strategy of decomposing larger facts into smaller known facts.

Religion- This week we reviewed the Two Great Commandments that Jesus told his followers. We created an anchor chart with choices we can make to show our love for God and choices we make that do not show our love for God. We made a promise as a class to do at least one action a day that shows our love for God. Ask your child how our Lenten sacrifice jar ties in with the Two Great Commandments.

Science- This week students learned about what makes up weather. We discussed that three simple elements, heat, air, and water, make up weather. Ask your child how fast the strongest wind ever recorded was and what weather tool is used to measure wind speed.
